From Palm Sunday to the Cross to the Empty Tomb

As we journey through Holy Week together, we are drawn once again to the heart of our faith—the cross of Christ and the joy of His resurrection. This coming week invites us to pause, to reflect, and to remember the extraordinary love God has shown us in Jesus. On Good Friday, we stand in awe before the cross. There, Jesus bore the weight of the world's sin-our sin—out of a love so deep, it defies understanding. His sacrifice wasn't a defeat but a victory over sin and death. He gave Himself fully so that we might be forgiven and reconciled to God. But the story does not end at the tomb. On Easter morning, we rejoice in the glorious truth that Christ is risen! The resurrection is not merely an event of the past—it is the living hope that transforms our present and shapes our future. Because Jesus lives, we too shall live. Let us walk this week with open hearts, embracing both the sorrow and the joy. May the cross humble us, and may the empty tomb fill us with hope, peace, and a renewed desire to follow our risen Lord. I encourage us all to gather with the Church family throughout the week starting this Palm Sunday, then on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday at 7pm at All Saints Church, Good Friday, 11am Walk of Witness in Littlehampton, 2.30pm An Hour at the Cross

Are you hiding a light under a bushel?

Dear Church Family, As we approach our APCM, it feels the right time to highlight an upcoming challenge we face as a family, to see how we might be able to solve it together. Our wonderful Churchwardens, Ann and Clare have been so incredibly committed to making All Saints function, especially during our vacancy, and we have been truly spoiled by the amount of time they have dedicated to our church. But now the time has come for Clare to step down after 7 years. Thank you, Clare, and Jon, for carrying so many church jobs for so long, often under the radar. You have gone well above and beyond what is expected of any Churchwardens and we are truly grateful for all you have done and continue to do. We don't know what we would have done without you, and that makes you, Clare, a hard act to follow! In fact, it's been so hard, that we haven't found a willing replacement yet! Our concern now is that we may only have one Churchwarden, Ann, from our APCM onwards. So, we've been looking at how we can split up the tasks Clare and Ann have been managing for our services, buildings and other commitments into more manageable chunks that can be shared more widely amongst our church family - including you! We are blessed with a wide range of skills and experience across our congregations and love seeing everyone bring them together for the benefit of our community. So, are you hiding a light under a bushel? Do you have a spare hour or two or more a month that you could offer to help make things happen? You might not be able to move chairs, but could you sit by the door and count how many people come to our services once a month at your regular service? Or perhaps you could be in charge of the communion bread at one of the services you attend each month? These roles are just as important as the "bigger" or more visible roles, but Ann and I would be so grateful not to have to think about them each week! There's such a wide range of things we're looking for help with and many of them can be shared too. By setting up teams and rotas for each task, there would be a pool of people who could ask each other for cover as well. The sorts of other things that need adding to rotas (mostly at Wick Hall) include:

- \cdot Setting up the AV equipment
- · Operating the AV
- \cdot Getting out and putting back the banners each Sunday
- · The defibrillator needs a check once a week (that must be recorded)
- · Lighting the candles ten minutes before the start of a service
- · Carrying out fire extinguisher/lightning conductor checks as needed
- \cdot Opening up the church or hall for tradespeople etc. and reading a book or working while they work

- · Doing a weekly check of the heating times for the main hall on the phone app and making sure they match the needs of the bookings
- · Basic DIY (painting, maintenance)
- Gardening
- · Back up cover for refreshments and set up teams
- · Sweeping up at the end of the service

Brief descriptions of the roles will be added to our website shortly with details of what's involved. We'll include the links in the newsletter when they're ready. If you would like to offer a little time for something that has not been mentioned, please do drop an email to Lisa or Ann to see how it could be applied. Basically, we want to spread the load so that nobody feels burdened by everything that has to be done. Ann's role can then be that of a more traditional Churchwarden and she can be a point of contact rather than the 'doer' of everything that needs doing. And, if you think that all this delegation makes the role of Churchwarden something you would like to explore, please speak to Lisa, thank you! One last thing: please don't worry if you can't help at the moment – there is a time for everything and a place for everyone and we get that. As we move into this new season, let's belong, believe and become even more united as we pull together!

PALM SUNDAY BIBLE READING

Luke 19:28-40

28 After Jesus had said this, he went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem. 29 As he approached Bethphage and Bethany at the hill called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples, saying to them, 30 'Go to the village ahead of you, and as you enter it, you will find a colt tied there, which no one has ever ridden. Untie it and bring it here. 31 If anyone asks you, "Why are you untying it?" say, "The Lord needs it." 32 Those who were sent ahead went and found it just as he had told them. 33 As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, 'Why are you untying the colt?' 34 They replied, 'The Lord needs it.' 35 They brought it to Jesus, threw their cloaks on the colt and put Jesus on it. 36 As he went along, people spread their cloaks on the road. 37 When he came near the place where the road goes down the Mount of Olives, the whole crowd of disciples began joyfully to praise God in loud voices for all the miracles they had seen: 38 'Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord!' 'Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!' 39 Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to Jesus, 'Teacher, rebuke your disciples!' 40 'I tell you,' he replied, 'if they keep quiet, the stones will cry out.'

EASTER SUNDAY BIBLE READING

John 20: 1-18

1 Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene went to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the entrance. 2 So she came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved, and said, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we don't know where they have put him!' 3 So Peter and the other disciple started for the tomb. 4 Both were running, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. 5 He bent over and looked in at the strips of linen lying there but did not go in. 6 Then Simon Peter came along behind him and went straight into the tomb. He saw the strips of linen lying there, 7 as well as the cloth that had been wrapped round Jesus' head. The cloth was still lying in its place, separate from the linen. 8 Finally the other disciple, who had reached the tomb first, also went inside. He saw and believed. 9 (They still did not understand from Scripture that Jesus had to rise from the dead.) 10 Then the disciples went back to where they were staying. 11 Now Mary stood outside the tomb crying. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb 12 and saw two angels in white, seated where Jesus' body had been, one at the head and the other at the foot. 13 They asked her, 'Woman, why are you crying?' 'They have taken my Lord away,' she said, 'and I don't know where they have put him.' 14 At this, she turned round and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not realise that it was Jesus. 15 He asked her, 'Woman, why are you crying? Who is it you are looking for?' Thinking he was the gardener, she said, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have put him, and I will get him.' 16 Jesus said to her, 'Mary.' She turned towards him and cried out in Aramaic, 'Rabboni!' (which means 'Teacher').

17 Jesus said, 'Do not hold on to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father. Go instead to my brothers and tell them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God."' 18 Mary Magdalene went to the disciples with the news: 'I have seen the Lord!' And she told them that he had said these things to her.
